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OVERVIEW INTRODUCTION



Support the introduction of this image by filling a seaside bucket with shells and water. Ask children if they have visited the seaside. Have they put their feet in the sea?

Talk with the children about seas and oceans, e.g. about seawater being salty and about waves and tides. Explain that the Earth's surface is largely covered by sea and that the seas and oceans are very deep in places and are home to some incredible creatures and plants.

Vocabulary

Sea, ocean, fish, rocks, seaweed, waves, shark, whale, mermaid, starfish, shell, seahorse, octopus, squid, eel, shoal, triggerfish, boat, submarine, crab, jellyfish, coral, sponge, sea anemone.











Can you make an 'Under the sea' world? You could make a 'dry' sea world in a large cardboard box, or a water version using an old washing-up bowl or plastic ice-cream container.

Put some pebbles and shells, if you have them, on the bottom and add plastic sea creatures. If you don't have these, just cut shapes out of empty plastic containers. You could also add plants for seaweed.

Pour the water into the container very carefully. If you have blue or green food colouring, you could add a few drops to colour the 'seawater'.





In the blue-green sea that surrounds a tiny island, you might just be lucky enough to catch a glimpse of a silvery fishtail weaving in and out of the coral reef. But this is no fish! This is Serena – a mermaid – and she's searching for treasure... not the treasure that pirates get excited about; Serena is looking for shells – tiny, pearly, coloured shells. Her big sister has a birthday very soon and a present has to be found! There are no shops on the seabed, so Serena decides to make her sister a shell necklace.

The mermaid has been searching for hours but her basket isn't nearly full enough. Suddenly she sees her friend, Octavia, a pretty little octopus, who waves at Serena with all of her eight tentacles.

"Hi, Octavia," says Serena, "I'm so pleased to see you – I need some help and you're the perfect friend to ask!" The mermaid explains about the birthday and the necklace... "With your eight tentacles you could pick up heaps of shells really quickly. Please will you help me?"

Octavia propels herself through the sea like a rocket, collecting shells from the nooks and crannies along the seabed. She travels so quickly that she wakes a shoal of triggerfish dozing in the reef, and they dart to and fro, grumbling angrily about their disturbed nap. In a few minutes, the little octopus comes back with a pile of shells, filling the basket to the brim. "Thank you, Octavia, that's wonderful – you saved the day!" says Serena, and with a flick of her silvery tail, she swims off with her treasure.

The best shells are soon threaded onto a thin piece of seaweed and Serena's big sister is delighted with her present. "That's good," said Serena, "because you might get a shell bracelet and tiara next year – I have so many shells left over!"


