1. Introduction

Intimate care is any care which involves washing, touching or carrying out an invasive procedure (such as cleaning up a pupil after they have soiled themselves) to intimate personal areas. In most cases, such care will involve cleaning for hygiene purposes as part of a staff member's duty of care. In the case of a specific procedure, only a person suitably trained and assessed as competent should undertake the procedure, (e.g. the administration of rectal diazepam.) The issue of intimate care is a sensitive one; it will require staff to be respectful of the pupil's needs. The pupil's dignity should always be preserved; with a high level of privacy, choice and control. There shall be a high awareness of child protection issues. Staff behaviour must be open to scrutiny and staff must work in partnership with parents/carers to provide continuity of care to pupils wherever possible.



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2. <u>Aims</u>

This policy aims to ensure that:

- Intimate care is carried out properly by staff, in line with any agreed plans.
- The dignity, rights and wellbeing of pupils are safeguarded.
- Pupils with intimate care difficulties are not discriminated against, in line with the Equalities Act 2010.
- Parents are assured that staff are knowledgeable about intimate care and that the needs of their children are taken into account.
- Staff carrying out intimate care work do so within guidelines (i.e. health and safety, manual handling, safeguarding protocols awareness) that protect themselves and the pupils involved.

Intimate care refers to any care which involves toileting, washing, changing, touching or carrying out an invasive procedure to pupils' intimate personal areas.

3. Legislation and statutory guidance.

- This policy complies with statutory safeguarding guidance (KCSIE 2021).
- It also complies with our funding agreement and articles of association.

The management of all pupils with intimate care needs will be carefully planned. The pupil who requires intimate care; will be treated with respect at all times; the pupil's welfare and dignity are of paramount importance.

Staff who provide intimate care are trained to do so (including Child Protection and Health and Safety training in lifting and moving) and are fully aware of best practice. Apparatus will be provided to assist with pupils who need special arrangements following assessment from physiotherapist/ occupational therapist as required.

Staff will be supported to a adapt their practice in relation to the needs of individual pupils taking into account developmental changes such as the onset of puberty and menstruation.

Wherever possible staff who are involved in the intimate care of pupils will not usually be involved with the delivery of sex education to the pupils in their care as an additional safeguard to both staff and pupils involved. The pupil will be supported to achieve the highest level of autonomy that is possible given their age and abilities. Staff will encourage each pupil to do as much for him/herself as he/she can. This may mean, for example, giving the pupil responsibility for washing themselves. Individual intimate care plans will be drawn up for particular pupils



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as appropriate to suit the circumstances of the pupil. Each pupil's right to privacy will be respected.

Careful consideration will be given to each pupil's situation to determine how many carers might need to be present when a pupil is toileted. Where possible one pupil will be catered for by one adult unless there is a sound reason for having more adults present. If this is the case, the reasons should be clearly documented. Wherever possible the same pupil will not be cared for by the same adult on a regular basis; ideally there will be a rota of carers known to the pupil who will take turns in providing care. This will ensure, as far as possible, that

over-familiar relationships are discouraged from developing, whilst at the same time guarding against the care being carried out by a succession of completely different carers. Intimate care arrangements will be discussed with parents/carers on a regular basis and recorded on the pupil's care plan. The needs and wishes of pupils and parents will be taken into account wherever possible within the constraints of staffing and equal opportunities legislation.

4. <u>Role of parents</u>

4.1 Seeking parental permission

For pupils who need routine or occasional intimate care (e.g. for toileting or toileting accidents), parents will be asked to sign a consent form. For pupils whose needs are more complex or who need particular support outside of what's covered in the permission form (if used), an intimate care plan will be created in discussion with parents (see section 3.2 below). Where there isn't an intimate care plan in place, parental permission will be sought before performing any intimate care procedure. If the school is unable to get in touch with parents and an intimate care procedure urgently needs to be carried out, the procedure will be carried out to ensure the child is comfortable, and the school will inform parents afterwards.

4.2 Creating an intimate care plan

Where an intimate care plan is required, it will be agreed in discussion between the school, parents, the child (when possible) and any relevant health professionals. The school will work with parents and take their preferences on board to make the process of intimate care as comfortable as possible, dealing with needs sensitively and appropriately. Subject to their age and understanding, the preferences of the child will also be taken into account. If there's doubt whether the child is able to make an informed choice, their parents will be consulted. The plan will be reviewed twice a year, even if no changes are necessary, and updated regularly, as well as whenever there are changes to a pupil's needs. 4.3 Sharing information

The school will share information with parents as needed to ensure a consistent approach. It will expect parents to also share relevant information regarding any intimate matters as needed. Any child protection records linked to the pupil will need to be transferred to their new school within 5 days of leaving. KCSIE Annex C.



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5. <u>Role of staff</u>

5.1 Which staff will be responsible

Members of staff involved with intimate care includes:

- All St Hugh's Catholic Primary Voluntary Academy Teaching staff
- Administration staff
- Teaching Assistants
- Midday Supervisors

No other staff members can be required to provide intimate care. All staff at the school who carry out intimate care will have been subject to an enhanced Disclosure and Barring Service (DBS) with a barred list check before appointment, as well as other checks on their employment history.

5.2 How staff will be trained

Staff will receive:

- Training in the specific types of intimate care they undertake
- Regular safeguarding training
- If necessary, manual handling training that enables them to remain safe and for the pupil to have as much participation as is possible

They will be familiar with:

- The control measures set out in risk assessments carried out by the school
- Hygiene and health and safety procedures
- They will also be encouraged to seek further advice as needed.

The Governing Body have wider responsibilities under the Equalities Act 2010 and will ensure that our school strives to do the best for all of the pupils, irrespective of disability, educational needs, race, nationality, ethnic or national origin, pregnancy, maternity, sex, gender identity, religion or sexual orientation or whether they are looked-after children.



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6. <u>Intimate care procedures</u>

6.1 How procedures will happen

Due to staffing numbers it is only required for one member of staff to provide intimate care. If a member of staff feels they would like a second member of staff there will always be one near by. Where possible all intimate care will take place in an appropriate private space ensuring another member of staff is around to be called. All intimate care will be logged on CPOMS Procedures will be carried out in a COVID-safe way according to the school's risk assessment and COVID- 19 protocol.

When carrying out procedures, the school will provide staff with:

- A changing mat
- Gloves
- Wipes
- Nappy sacks
- Aprons
- Nappy Bin

For pupils needing routine intimate care, the school expects parents to provide, when necessary, a good stock (at least a week's worth in advance) of necessary resources, such as nappies, underwear and/or a spare set of clothing. Any soiled clothing will be contained securely, clearly labelled, and discreetly returned to parents at the end of the day.

6.2 <u>Concerns about safeguarding</u>

If a member of staff carrying out intimate care has concerns about physical changes in a child'sappearance (e.g. marks, bruises, soreness), they will report this using the school's safeguarding procedures. If a child is hurt accidentally or there is an issue when carrying out the procedure, the staff member will report the incident immediately to Mr G Hughes,

Miss M Blood, Miss P Noor or Mr D Ballard. If a child makes an allegation against a member of staff, the responsibility for intimate care of that child will be given to another member of staff as quickly as possible and the allegation will be investigated according to the school's safeguarding procedures.

7. <u>Monitoring arrangements</u>

This policy will be reviewed and approved by our CMAT board every 3 years.
